

Nevada Election Update 2024

Nevada will have a Presidential Primary election in 2024, organized and funded by the Nevada Secretary of State.

The Nevada Republican Party will hold caucus meetings on February 8, 2024, to select their presidential nominee. The caucus meetings, organized and funded by the Nevada Republican Party, are closed. You must be a registered Republican to participate, and a government-issued ID is required.

Ballot Measures 2024

VOTE NO on Question 3- Top Five Primary and Rank Choice Voting Initiative

If this measure is approved by a majority of voters in 2024, our constitution will be amended, and these changes will take effect for the state's 2026 elections. This legislation has two components; if passed, both will be enacted.

Top Five Primary - Candidates for the offices of United States Senator, United States Representative, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, State Controller, and State Legislators would run in a single primary election, regardless of a candidate's party affiliation. The five candidates that receive the most votes advance to the general election.

Rank Choice Voting - At the general election, voters would elect state and federal candidates by ranking the five candidates that advanced from their top-five primaries. A candidate needs a simple majority of the vote (50%+1) to be declared the winner of an election. If no candidate wins a simple majority of the vote, the candidate with the fewest 1st place votes would be eliminated. People who voted for that candidate as their first choice would have their votes redistributed to their next choice. The tabulation process would continue until a candidate receives a majority of the vote and is declared the winner. This method can result in the original top vote-getter losing the race. Voters do not have the option of re-prioritizing their votes when candidates are eliminated.

Ranked choice voting makes casting a ballot more time-consuming, more complicated, and more confusing for voters. Ballots are more likely to be thrown out, and **your vote** would no longer count. Out-of-state corporate billionaires are pushing this overly complex and burdensome system to influence our elections.

Ensure your Vote Counts

- Check Your Voter Registration - Before elections, check your voter registration to ensure you are registered with the correct party affiliation.
- Early Voting vs. Election Day - In the past, Republicans have voted on Election Day. Party leaders now recommend that people not wait and consider voting during Early Voting instead.
- Ballot Harvesting - Ballot harvesting is when political operatives collect mail-in ballots from voters' homes and drop them off at a polling place, election office or drop box. This practice can and has been abused across the country. It is, however, the law in Nevada. Republicans must learn to accept the early voting / ballot harvesting reality and exploit the new rules. We urge fellow Republicans to vote as early as possible and to organize groups that gather ballots at religious gatherings, sports events, grocery stores, main streets and shopping malls.
- Poll Watching - We need poll watchers at every polling place in Nevada to ensure that election laws are followed. Democrats will have multiple paid watchers at every location. Nevada GOP trains and recruits volunteer poll watchers.
- Nevada also hires paid poll workers. You must be registered to vote, at least 18 years of age, and a resident of the county where you apply. Training is required. Sign up to help safeguard fair elections. Contact your local county clerk or registrar of voters for more information.
